Editorial: Organisations

At one time of course there weren't any! Back in 1971 and 72, when there were only a few dozen players in the hobby and the number of zines could be counted on the fingers of half a hand they were neither wanted nor needed. But times change, hobbies grow, and tike most aspects of modern life as something gets bigger it gets ever more complex. The BDC was formed, much to the annoyance of most people at the time, and gradually developed into the NGC of today, changing as it did so into the integral part of the hobby it has become today and offering an ever-improving service to its members. Outside the NGC the IDA gradually gained acceptance and eventually resulted in the formation of IDA/UK to provide necessary services, mostly to the non-NGC sector but in certain areas to the hobby as a whole.

So far so good, on the face of it, but of course there are several things wrong with the existing set-up. The NGC is far too insular in its attitudes to a hobby which is, by its very nature, an international one, and far too ready to take the easy way out all the time by simply concentrating on its own back yard and not bothering to make the effort to look up and see what's going on in the rest of the world. Despite numerous attempts from both America and Europe for contact and cooperation scarcely anything has been achieved - examples that spring to mind are the disgracefully rude and arrogant reactions to all of Walter Luc Haas' attempts at contact and the complete ignoring of such things as the World Variant Bank, International Subscription Exchange and the 75/76 Postal Diplomacy Tournament. No doubt there are others. Admittedly in the cases of the WVB and ISE this attitude seems to be improving a little, but its a sad reflection on the club that it was ever bad in the first place. It just goes to show that the NGC, as it is currently set up, just isn't equipped to deal with all the international aspects of the hobby. The other principal failing of the present set-up is that the one organisation that is international, both in name, and fact, is far too small to do more than a token amount of good - the memberskip of IDA/UK is less than 10% that of the NGC. But the fact still remains that both organisations exist and at least to some extent work reasonably well - don't think that by pointing out faults I'm saying there are no good points, nothing could be further from the truth. At the moment they both do a passably reasonable job, but my point is that between them they have the potential to do an excellent job if only they'd get down to it.

Why do we have to have arguments and rivalries between the so-called 'NGC' and 'independant' parts of the hobby? Why must zines be either 'NGC' or 'independant'? Why even do we have to have both NGC and IDA/UK? We're all of us part of the same hobby and I really can't see why we have to continue to put up-with-all-the-petty-rivabries-and-fouds-between-these-artificially-createdsections of it. Just because it's been that way in the past is no reason why it should continue. Wouldn't it be a lot better for all of us if the Dippy section of the NGC became a centralised game-starting service for all zines who (for a small fee) wished to make use of it ((question Birks: you have said that when you get a letter asking for a game in MP you throw it in the waste bin - why not forward it?)) with additional responsibilities for looking after orphans, welcoming new hobby members and encouraging new publishers - in fact, generally providing the necessary services for the whole of the British hobby. The IDA/UK - which by then could quite conceivably be called the international section of the NGC - could then concentrate on being responsible only for international matters, instead of having to try to look after various aspects of the present 'independant' sector as well and consequently getting itself overstretched.

But the one thing that is abundantly clear is that this <u>can</u> be accomplished by the existing organisations - either separately by mutual agreement or by merger and change - given goodwill and effort on all sides. Now that I'm acting Regional Secretary for IDA/UK I will be working towards some sort of understanding

on this matter and might even consider standing for election to the NGC Committee this year as 'International Secretary' or somesuch on just such a ticket.

What it all boils down to is that all the feuding and fighting can be forgotten if people are prepared to discuss things in a reasonable and adult manner. But it can only be brought about if the existing organisations are really willing to think of the hobby rather than themselves, and that means there are going to have to be a lot of compromises reached. But it's the existing organisations that will have to do it, this is no time for creating additional ones, and the best time to start is right now. I hope to expand on this theme next issue, including the financial aspects, but in the meantime comments would be welcome....

War Bulletin

Another obituary, this time for one of the real founding fathers of the hobby. First started by Dave Berg in May 1970, War Bulletin was only the second British Dippyzine to see the light of day. Taken over by Hartley Patterson after 11 issues it represented the mainstream of the hobby all on its own until the first great zine explosion of 1972. Later in 1972 it began the World's first postal game of 4000AD (which I won, he adds modestly...) and right up to issue 65, the final issue which appeared last month, it set the standards for layout and contents which all later zines were to follow. But in recent issues it has become increasingly obvious that Hartley's interests are moving away from postal Dip and so he has finally brought the zine to an end with the completion of all but one of the games (which is to continue by carbon copy).

It's always a shame to see a zine fold, but it's particularly sad when it's one of the most significant zines in the history of the British hobby. I'd like to take this opportunity of thanking Hartley for many interesting years of War Bulletins, for keeping the hobby going in those early years and for all the time and effort he has always been ready to contribute. Goodbye Hartley, and good luck.

Letters

PHIL STUTT. The main reason for this letter is the fate of the Polaris games. I trust that I am not 'treading on your toes' by announcing that I will re-house these games. I have two reasons for trying to reallocate the games. The first is that when Geoff took on Polaris as well as Hyperec I expressed fears that it may prove too much for him. Unhappily I was right. The second reason is that I am beginning to feel a bit sensitive about the state of the independents at present, what with forming the Diplomacy Federation etc... We could expect some bad press from certain members of the NGC if P fell to the wayside. That being so, I did not want the delay to grow too long, and waiting for someone else to pick up the pieces would have been irresponsible.

I realise that you may not like to join (yet) another Dippy organisation, but...we could add another string to your bow. Guaranteed games even. Not that they are necessary, but along with the g'tee we plan to open a gamestart service. Again, that will not be pertinant to MP so, why should you join? Really, I can't put forward any concrete benefits that you would gain except you would be able to influence the growth of the organisation. Is there anything that Dippy organisations should be doing in this country; but aren't? If so, help us provide those services. I quite realise that you are very fully committed already and with running IDA/UK you may want to decline this invitation. Even if you do decline I would like to make one point clear: the DF is not NGC-baiting or out to knock any particular organisation. As far as I am concerned the DF is the best way in which I can help and serve the hobby. If we can help the IDA/UK at all I am sure that the others will agree to work with you. I hope that the relations between our two groups can be very harmonious.

((As far as the orphaned Polaris games are concerned rest assured you are certainly not 'treading on my toes' - I've never wanted the job of sorting out blasted orphans and only took it on because Pimley had failed at it and there was noone else willing to do it. Go and rehouse them by all means - you woldn't like the Black Spot and TUCA games as well, would you? Okay, only joking....

((I do not wish to join your Diplomacy Federation however as I can't see the point of it — and I'd prefer fever strings to my bow thanks, not more. Nothing that you have announced the DF will do is in any way new and there is little or nothing that needs to be done in this hobby that either the NGC or the IDA can't manage perfectly well themselves. What is the point in creating yet another organisation just for the sake of it? As I've already explained in the editorial I don't believe there are any services needed that can't be provided by the NGC or the IDA, or, preferably, a modified combination of them both. Indeed I'm rather shocked that you and Lovibond, as both IDA and NGC members, should try to set these things up independently. What was to stop you rescuing orphans, writing novice packages and all the rest of it in the name of IDA/UK for example? You'd probably even have got a subsidy for it! I think you're wasting a lot of your own time in mere duplication of effort and the most likely result will be several weak organisations instead of the one strong one that could have resulted if you'd left things alone.

Of course the fact that Haven is a member is a big black mark too - think of the harm he could do to newcomers who might be just naive enough to take him seriously. But even without our Will I consider DF to be irrelevant I'm afraid. I shall continue in my efforts to get IDA/UK to provide the independant sector with whatever is necessary until such time as a more loosely-organised, open and outward-looking NGC is capable of doing it itself. Let's live in harmony by all means, but please don't expect my support.))

Now here's a real laugh....

ANDY DAVIDSON. ((Starts by repeating his comments from last issue about orphans, then continues...)) The idea of an adjudicating committee which you and Sharp are planning fills me with revulsion. Supposedly non-affiliated, yet packed with the NGC/IDA establishment it is yet another device whereby they can expand their bureaucratic power. Interfering busybodies....

Talking of bureaucracy and revulsion reminds me of your incredible diatribe against Will Haven and his refusal to fall in line with your petty demands. If you're so upset about it, why don't you sue him yourself - I'm pretty sure you automatically have copyright to Multiplicity. Personally, I think your attitude stinks and I no longer wish to play in 'I' game.

((You stupid child. I ask you to come onto that committee as a supposedly neutral person so you refuse and then accuse it of being unrepresentative. You want to have your cake and it too I suppose? As for Will, rest assured I had every intention of succing him, but as he has stopped selling Multiplicity there is no longer any need. I do indeed have copyright - everyone has automatic copyright on anything they write themselves, I've checked. Haven can be sued at any time by any designer of a variant he sells without written permission - so I should be condemned for giving him a timely warning about the thin ice he's

skating on should I? Don't be so stupid - open your eyes for once and try to see what's really going on, never mind what you'd like to think is happening.

JOHN LETTICE. The common zine collection area for traded zines is doomed. Some sap will take it on and do it for a few months, then slip up and/or vanish. Like the Variant Bank - I was one of only two GMs to oppose the variant bank at its inception. It screwed things up for everyone when they got a backlog, and looks to me to be an unmitigated failure. Can you guess who number two GM was? Full marks for Will Haven, oh, and Don Turnbull. On the subject of Haven, I'm glad the rest of the world's getting round to hating him. It was quite a strain on my own. As far as I can remember, registering copuright is dead easy. I don't know what you do in England, but in Scotland you just send a copy to the National Library of Scotland.

((The zine collection flyer goes out to publishers with this issue - I'll wait for their reaction before passing judgement. It wasn't the idea of the Variant Bank that was wrong, rather the people running it - you're a fine one to start predicting dropouts though aren't you? Copyright is dead easy - in fact in England you don't have to send anything anywhere, it's automatic. See also Hartley's letter.))

HARTLEY PATTERSON. Bill Orr is perhaps unaware that common distribution of trades is a very old idea. In SF fandom they are called Apas (from 'Amateur Press Association') and operate much along the lines Bill proposes. In addition many Apas include apazines which only circulate within the Apa and mostly consist of comments on the previous mailing. The UK has one SF Apa called Ompa, there are lots in America. Some even have waiting lists to get in!

I somewhat resent being made responsible for Will Haven's VB. Will was already selling Xeroxed copies to his own readers before the Herd/Pink VB ran into trouble. I asked in several issues of VB for evidence that Herd & Pink were running things badly, and eventually more through Pink's silence than through any help from others (only one player bothered to contact me) I asked for publicity for volunteers to run a proper VB. Only two persons came forward, and of these Will seemed the most likely not to drop out, which I thought was the most important requirement. I hold no brief for Will of course, and I don't approve of his selling without permission. Nevertheless the choice at the time was Will or nothing.

Designers should note that copyright is theirs unless and until they revoke it in writing. Even Xeroxing a single copy is an infringement of this.

((Thanks for the Apa info, fascinating - I wonder id Bill realises what he may be letting himself in for? My apologies to you Hartley if I gave the wrong impression last issue. If the choice was Will or nothing then clearly little else could possibly have been done - though I wonder if we'd have been that much worse off if you'd plumped for the 'nothing'? In point of fact of course if Will was already selling Xerox copies to his readers anyway then the fact that he suddenly became a UKVB really meant very little, as he doesn't seem to be doing very much more than selling to his readers even now. Dave Allen should by now have visited Walter Luc Haas and have discussed with him the possibility of the NGC VB becoming the British agent for the WVB - I think he was due to go last week. If they can work something out between them we might yet be able to get a really workable VB set up in this country. I hope so.))

E&OE game. I've had the following note from Norman Nathan. 'I shall send the next issue to all the players, within the next week. 
